We're 50 years old and still going strong!

Star Fish was established in 1971 to provide emergency food assistance to our neighbors in Plainfield. Fifty years later and with the help of our resilient and dedicated volunteers, we continue to respond to the need for food.

We began with a small operation in Covenant United Methodist Church as well as in the basement at Eileen Cunniff's home. Mary Nischwitz worked the east end of town from the Pantry and Eileen the west. Food donations would be divided between the two locations, with Eileen's basement the western pantry. Her family and friends all participated.

People in need would call our number and an answering service took their information. Within a few years, volunteers took the place of the answering service. Mary and Eileen would check in, find out who needed food, the number of adults and children, and their addresses, They would then prepare bags of food and they or another volunteer would deliver to those in need.

Over time, this split system proved to be unwieldy, and a single location was selected—Covenant United, where we are today.

We occupy a space in the basement off the assembly/meeting room. It was originally the church's choir room where robes and such were stored. Covenant United allowed us to use it because the church's then-pastor was one of the founders of Star Fish back in 1971. We in turn give Covenant United an annual stipend to help off-set their overall utility and maintenance costs.

The Pantry was set up with four rows of wooden shelving of nearequal length. On one wall, there is a counter area attached with

shelves above and below. There are three aisles, like the one at the left, with food storage on both sides of the aisles, while the third aisle has one refrigerator and four freezers for cold storage.

In 2018, the church gave us permission to expand a little. We pushed



one wall back about four feet and added a wall of shelving (shown at the right).

We also moved our entry doors down the hallway about fifteen feet and added shelving in that new space as well (you can see that in the photo on page 1). This allowed us to consolidate all of our food storage within the pantry

Due to Covid-19 restrictions, we cut back from our previous Tuesday, Thursday and Friday morning schedule to operating just Tuesday and Thursdays. Our director, Patty Bixel, schedules additional mornings as needed to accept food deliveries and to package food for special needs.

Our support for the Plainfield Food Security Project keeps us busy and keeps the food going out the doors every week, with 40 to 50 bags of groceries and 150 dozen fresh eggs helping to feed the hungry in Plainfield. We also support the food project at Plainfield High School with 15 to 20 bags of groceries that include pancake mix, syrup, and fresh bread that we purchase from Aldi's.

Your support, in donated food or personal care items or money, helped us meet our mission to feed the hungry in Plainfield over the past 50 years and, hopefully, will continue for years to come.

Mt. St. Mary Academy Cereal Bowl

One of those great programs that occur quietly every year and without much fanfare is the cereal donation we receive from students and faculty at Mt. St. Mary Academy in Watchung, led by Donna Toryak, Admissions Director.

We are not sure of the first year of the program, but we do know that our Patty Bixel helped establish the Cereal Bowl with its special trophy.

Normally run at the same time period as the football Super Bowl, the Cereal Bowl was set up as a friendly competition among the various homerooms. Each homeroom was challenged to collect cereal during the competition, trying to outdo their peers and see who could collect the most cereal.



Boxes and boxes of cereal come into the school, stacking up in each classroom while the competition rages on. When all is said and done, one class is named the victor, receiving the coveted Cereal Bowl to proudly display until the next competition. See next page.

Cereal Bowl (cont'd)

Now is when we step into the program. Our volunteers go up to the Mount and collect the bags of cereal. Sounds easy, right? Just try lifting an extra-large trash bag filled with cereal boxes– they are heavy!

Nonetheless, we fill our cars and trucks and bring the bags (shown on previous page) to the Pantry and where we store them.

On our last trip in 2019, we opened each bag and then repacked the cereal into lawn leaf bags, smaller than the black plastic and easier to handle and store away on our shelves.



With four of us working, we each opened the plastic bags and put the cereal on round tables. When we finished, two of us had 75 boxes of cereal and two had 50 boxes—as if we planned it!

Repacking into the leaf bags resulted in bags with approximately 20 boxes each. They stack neatly on the shelf in the pantry and are marked and ready to use when needed (photo at left).

Such a great program at the Mount, year after year providing us with a steady supply of cereal. With Covid closings, we missed the

Cereal Bowl last year but know that the students are busily collecting now for a delivery soon.

New Friends

We have made and enjoyed lots of friends over the years. Many of these friends were volunteers who worked on a regular basis or on special events such as our holiday dinner projects. Perhaps you are one of those friends?

Covid-19 has brought us new friends, people who have learned of our Pantry and the work that we do to help feed the hungry in Plainfield. Some are individuals, others are groups or local churches.

Many of these groups continue to donate food to help fill the pantry. Many of the individuals choose to donate through PayPal to help us purchase food to supplement donations. We buy fresh bread, eggs, and specialty items such as pancake mix and syrup for kids' breakfasts.

We are a group of volunteers from Plainfield and the surrounding area who belong to a tax exempt, 501(c)(3) non-profit corporation in existence since 1971. We operate three days each week throughout the year, preparing and distributing grocery food orders to an average of thirty to thirty-five families in need each week.

Our primary function is to maintain the food pantry. Our volunteers pack and deliver grocery food orders to clients who have been referred to us by local social service agencies. Most of these agencies are listed on our website <u>Partners page</u>.

Using a referral system helps us better manage our resources. These agencies vet the client to help assure that our limited resources are given to those truly in need. We also prepare special food orders for 160 families at Easter, Thanksgiving, and at Christmas.

The generosity of our donors helps us prepare these holiday meals and bags of food each week for those in need of emergency food assistance. You are all "Stars for Star Fish!"

The Food We Provide To Those In Need—Amounts Vary Based on Family Size
